The running time is 1 hour and 30 minutes including an interval.

Unfortunately Latecomers cannot be admitted.

Studio 2 is an intimate performance space situated downstairs close to a bar and toilets, with lift access and has just around 100 seats. The box office is situated directly ahead as you enter they foyer and there are plenty of customer service staff on hand to assist in any way they can.

Trafalgar Studio 2 is situated in Whitehall, near Charing Cross Train Station, Post code SW1A 2DY, as you enter the venue the box office is directly in front of you.

This accompaniment gives you an overview of the synopsis, cast, stage design, Props, costumes, visual ambience, an extract from the programme, production credits and theatre Information. It has been written, performed and edited by Tim Calvert of Calvert Creative Concepts.

The Promotional material for *Actually* states

Simon Manyonda and Yasmin Paige star in Anna Ziegler's much talked about new play *Actually*.

Amber (Yasmin Paige) and Tom (Simon Manyonda) hook up at a party at their elite American university, and spend the night together. They agree on the drinking, they agree on the attraction, but what actually happened between them?

With wit and urgency, *Actually* investigates the highly charged topic of sexual consent, the complex intersection of race and gender politics, our crippling desire to fit in, and the three sides to every story.

Actually was first staged in The USA in 2017 and premieres for the first time in the UK at Trafalgar studios.

The Director of the play Oscar Toeman describes it as an experience that is totally open to interpretation.

The production is supported by the Royal Victoria Hall foundation.

To get to Studio 2 you can go down a set of stairs or use the lift which is adjacent to a bar area and toilets.

As you enter Studio 2 there are 3 rows of just under a 100 seats on three sides that are red in colour, there are a few steps down to stage level

which is right in front of row A as studio 2 is a very intimate performance space.

The stage is open to you and is very minimalistic, it is made up of a square platform and a back wall area that has a slight opening on the left and a divide corridor in the centre with a mirror like wall on the inside reflecting light.

All of it has a black and white gradient design that looks like a mash up of black grey and white colours mixing and swirling together.

There are no other set pieces used in the performance apart from a silver hip flask that contains tequila that the character of Amber takes out of her Jeans pocket and a white feather that falls from the ceiling. Both occur at the end of the play.

Actually features the characters of Amber and Tom who are both 18 and Freshman American students.

The narrative of the play jumps forward and back in time and alternates between the characters interacting together in scenes, to then talking to the audience in the form of a monologue. These switch back and forth quite rapidly. When music is heard in the background the characters are at a party engaging in conversation etc.

Amber is played by actress Yasmin Paige and is white, slim and attractive with dark eyes and long bushy dark hair, she wears a black-y, grey textured shirt that looks a little like a cardigan with a brown top underneath. Light blue jeans and fashionable black leather boots, a necklace and a wrist watch

Simon Manyonda portrays Tom he is a black male, tall, slim and attractive with a short afro style hairstyle, he wears a dark red and cream cheque shirt with a mustard t-shirt, dark Blue jeans and grey and white vans trainers.

They both use the full use of the stage and alternate between standing opposite each other in different formations during the scenes the characters interact to standing side by side with a gap in between during the monologue style performance. They sometimes crouch down or sit on the stage also.

They both use a full range of non-verbal communications from facial expression to hand movements to illustrate certain emotions.

The character of Tom uses his hands a lot to express how he is feeling especially during scenes of frustration and Amber fidgets a lot with her hands when irritated and during the confrontational scene during the end when voices are raised there is a lot of head and hand movement and plenty of facial gesture to signify the uneasy situation they are both in.

The lighting switches from bright beams of white to softer more subdued yellows and often creates a lot of shadow on the set, especially during the more intense dramatic moments.
